A fresh face from Longmeadow rises in bid to lead Senate

GLOBE STAFF As Senate Democrats prepare for a tense, closed-door meeting Wednesday amid a leadership crisis, a second-term lawmaker from Western Massachusetts has emerged as the latest potential candidate for Senate president — a post that Senator Stanley C. Rosenberg relinquished late last year after allegations about his husband's behavior.

State Senator Eric P. Lesser, 32, of Longmeadow, is pulling together a politically and geographically diverse faction of other relatively new faces to the Senate, according to one of his Democratic colleagues who is part of the coalition.

"I would feel very confident backing Eric as Senate president," said Senator Anne M. Gobi of Spencer. "He would be great as well as a fresh face for

She declined to name others who are also behind electing Lesser. But she said he represented a "fresh set of eyes" and would be able to lead the Senate into a new era.

"He is very sensible, and he is someone who can absolutely cross not only internal party division lines but also partisan lines," Gobi said. Lesser, who came to the Sen-

ate in 2015 fresh from Harvard Law School and top positions in the Obama White House, declined to comment about his Already over the weekend

Senators Sal N. DiDomenico of Everett and Karen E. Spilka of Ashland, were reaching out to colleagues in efforts to lock down support for their bids to become Senate president, according to people familiar with the efforts. Senator Eileen M. Donoghue of Lowell said in De-

cember she would seek the Senate's top job, should it open.

But none of the contenders seem to have put together a solid majority of 16 Democrats out of the 31-member caucus.

"There's been some conversation: Are Sal and Karen *really* the only two choices?" said another Democratic state senator, who requested anonymity to

keep his or her options open. "I think that's given some other folks room to put their hat in the ring, like Eric."

The senator said Lesser's strengths include energy, vouth, and professionalism and his previous experience in national politics. "There's a desire among senators to put some more big wins on the board for the Legislature, and the thought is that he might be able to do that."

One question that has roiled presidential machinations is how long acting Senate President Harriette L. Chandler will remain in the post.

The 80-year-old Worcester Democrat was elected to the presidency in December when Rosenberg temporarily stepped aside after allegations against his husband, Bryon Hefner.

In November, The Boston Globe detailed accusations from four unnamed men who

alleged that Hefner had sexually assaulted or harassed them and who said that Hefner bragged he could influence Senate business. Though three of the alleged incidents took place when Rosenberg was just feet away, the Globe found no evidence that he knew about the

Rosenberg left the leadership position as a Senate committee investigates whether he broke Senate rules.

Meanwhile, the Globe reported over the weekend that Hefner had access to Rosenberg's e-mails, tried to affect the state budget, and involved himself in the workings of Rosenberg's office, and in Senate affairs — all after Rosenberg had promised a "firewall" between his personal life and legislative business.

Gobi said she would like to see a decision on Senate leadership soon. "I am not one who thinks we should drag this out," Gobi said. "I don't want to wait for the Globe to come out with another article that stabs our colleague in the heart."

Bentley University names new president

Bentley University, the Waltham school known for its business programs, named a former business school dean from the Midwest as its eighth president on Tuesday.

Alison Davis-Blake, 59, was business dean at both the University of Michigan and the University of Minnesota, each for five years during the past decade. She will take over at Bentley in July and succeed Gloria Larson, who announced last year that

search committee that selected Davis-Blake said she should be ready for "historic change" at the institution.

"Given the pace of change in business and higher education. the next 10 years will be as important to Bentley as our first 100," said Robert P. Badavas, who is also vice president of the Bentley trustees.

Bentley has about 4,000 undergraduates and 1,000 graduate students. It is known for both its undergraduate and graduate business programs. Tuition at Bentley is about \$48,000 per year, and the cost to attend is around \$69,000 when room and board are included, according to the school website.

The school is 56 percent white, 22 percent foreign students, 7 percent Asian, 6 percent Hispanic, and 3 percent black, according to federal data that all schools must report. The school admits about 46 percent of applicants, according to the federal data.

Davis-Blake called Bentley a "university on the rise" in a university press release Tuesday and said the school's job placement rate and business curriculum along with its emphasis on arts and sciences is a combination that is needed in higher education today.

As dean of the University of Michigan's Ross School of Business, Davis-Blake increased applications by 32 percent, increased the proportion of women and underrepresented minorities in the student body, and raised more than \$300 million as part of the university's capital campaign, according to a press release from Bentley.

In fiscal 2016, the most recent data publicly available, Larson earned a \$521,000 salary but was paid about \$753,000 total including bonuses and other compensation. Davis-Blake earned about \$600,000 as business dean at Michigan, according to news reports.

Andover will hire investigator to look into hockey program

Andover High School principal Philip Conrad plans to hire an outside investigator to review allegations that varsity hockey players were denied food and water as punishment for losing games, he said Tues-

Conrad's announcement comes amid a separate probe by the state Department of Children and Families. Head coach Chris Kuchar and two assistant coaches were placed on leave Jan. 24 after DCF notified school officials of the agency's investigation. In a statement Tuesday, the

Andover Public Schools said DCF initially advised town officials to "hold off" on performing their investigation while the state conducted its review. But DCF recently informed the school district that it could begin its own review, even though the agency's probe remains ongoing, the statement said.

Conrad now intends to select a "reputable independent professional" to handle the school district's review, with the permission of the School Com-The school district's investigation is not a "rush to judgment" but standard protocol in such cases, the statement said.

DCF is probing two incidents connected to the Andover High varsity hockey program.

In one of the alleged incidents, varsity hockey players

conditioning session" during a practice after the team lost a game, authorities have said. During that session, the students were allegedly not allowed a water break, according to the school district.

The other incident involves students being denied food after an away game as punishment for losing, according to school officials.

Kuchar's lawyer, Tom Gleason, previously told the Globe that his client "strongly denies the accusations that he has abused, neglected or in any way mistreated his hockey players. These allegations are false."

A DCF spokeswoman said Tuesday night that the agency is "still in the process of investigating this matter."

Gleason said Kuchar is cooperating with DCF officials and "fully expects to be back behind the bench, coaching his team, once the truth becomes known."

In Tuesday's statement from the school district, Conrad said hiring an independent investigator is in the best interest of Andover High, given "the level mittee, according to the release. of public interest in this situation and the need to have a finding which cannot be challenged for any reason, as well as the fact that the coaches have a reporting relationship to me as their supervisor."
